4.3 Outcomes for the disability community

- individuals taking part in the project.

You could also tell us the changes you expect to see in other organisations' policy and practice.

Your outcomes should address one or more of our values and explain the difference in terms of

- Personhood: how people with disability will have more choice and control in their lives.
- Citizenhood: how people with disability are active members in their communities.
- Capacity building: how people with disability will grow their skills to reach their goals.

'Measured by' is the measures you will put in place to know if you have achieved your outcomes. You can include quantitative (numbers) and qualitative (words) measures.

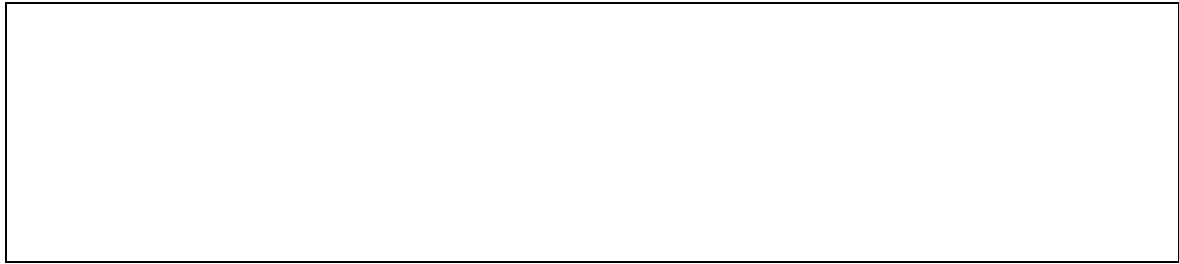
